Rubus squarrosus

Common Name(s):

Leafless lawyer, yellow-prickled lawyer

Current Threat Status (2012):

Not Threatened

Distribution:

Endemic. New Zealand: North and South Islands, from Ahipara south (scarce north of the Manawatu) and with the exception of Northland mainly easterly.

Habitat:

Coastal to montane. Usually in open areas, particularly in dunefield, grey scrub and other shrubland; open forest, river beds, cliff faces, or on talus and boulder slopes.

Flowering: Fruiting:

October - December February - March

Threats:

Not Threatened but often local and uncommon over large parts of its potential range. Some northern populations are very vulnerable to habitat destruction
