Laurus nobilis

Common Name(s):

bay tree, laurel

Current Threat Status (2009):

Exotic

Habitat:

Terrestrial. Persistent cultivation relic, can invade intact bush, waste land and scrub.

Features:

Large dioecious shrub or small tree to about 7 m. Usually multistemmed with smooth trunks, stems and leaves hairless. The leaves are aromatic (especially when crushed) petiole up to 13 mm long often purplish. Lamina to about 13 x $4.5\,\mathrm{cm}$, narrow elliptic with a slightly wavy margin. Male flowers are yellow while female flowers are white and are on separate plants. Fruits are black berries.

Flowering:

September, October, November
