



Eucalyptus botryoides

Common Name(s):

bangalay

Current Threat Status (2009):

Exotic

Habitat:

Terrestrial.

Features:

Tall tree to about 40 m with long, ascending, spreading branches bearing clusters of dark green leaves towards the apices. Leaves are broad-lanceolate, tapering to a fine-pointed apex, 10-16 cm by 3-6 cm wide, with a prominent midrib and numerous fine lateral veins at almost 90 degrees from the midrib. Petioles of up to 4 cm long are grooved or flat. Flower buds are cylindrical to club-shaped, 9 mm long on short stout pedicels, borne on short axillary peduncles about 1.5 mm long, in clusters of 7-11. Flowers are white or creamy white and up to 2 cm across. Fruits are cup-shaped, woody capsules up to 1.2 cm long by 0.9 cm across.

December, January, February
