# Pleurophyllum speciosum

## Common Name(s):

Great emperor daisy

# Current Threat Status (2012):

At Risk - Naturally Uncommon

# Distribution:

Endemic. Auckland and Campbell Islands.

# Habitat:

Coastal to montane herbfield

## Features\*:

Radicals leaves  $150\text{-}450 \times 100\text{-}250$  mm, appressed to ground or ascending, broadly obovate to subrhomboid, narrowed to broad base, coriaceous, margins remotely and indistinctly crenate to subentire, hydathodes hidden by tomentum; lateral veins ridged, almost as strong as midrib. 15-30; lamina loosely tomentose below, pilose on and near veins above and with nunmerous moniliform hairs on surface. Scapes stout, up to 1 m tall, tomentose above; lower leaves c.150 mm long,  $\pm$  oblong, upper diminishing gradually to bracts. Capitula c.60 mm diameter including long ray-florets, c.25 in subcorymbose racemes; ray-florets pale purple to white, disk-florets purple. Involucral bracts  $\pm$  clad in moniliform hairs, acute. Achenes densely strigose. Pappus-hairs not thickened above.

# Flowering:

## Fruiting:

December - February

January - May

#### Threats:

A naturally uncommon endemic. Widespread within its island habitants. The subantarctic islands on which it occurs are Nature Reserves and World Heritage sites with access only by permit, and strictly limited as to numbers of people.
