# Raoulia cinerea

### **Current Threat Status (2012):**

**Naturally Uncommon** 

### **Distribution:**

Endemic. South Island, mountains at the head of the Awatere River.

### **Habitat:**

Alpine in loose shingle, scree and sparsely vegetated rock pavement and fell field

#### Features\*:

Stock rather woody, stems rather closely branched, branchlets ascending, forming flat patches. Leaves closely imbricate, 3-nerved, ascending, incurved at tips, 5-7 mm long, linear, acuminate; basal portion membranous, c.1 mm wide, clad in loose tomentum; apical portion densely clad in appressed white tomentum, margins slightly revolute. Capitula up to 5 mm diameter; inner involucral bracts linear-lanceolate, acute, scarious, yellowish; apices pale brown, more or less pilose on back. Achenes hardly 1 mm long, narrow-oblong, glabrous to puberulous; pappushairs up to 5 mm long--some flattened towards base, others terete, all slender, not or hardly thickened at apex.

A local, narrow range endemic common within its preferred habitat
