Raoulia goyenii

Common Name(s):

Stewart Island vegetable sheep

Current Threat Status (2012):

Naturally Uncommon

Distribution:

Endemic. Stewart Island

Habitat:

Subalpine to alpine. In herbfield, fellfield and amongst rocks

Features*:

Stock and branch-bases woody; branches densely compacted, forming greenish cushions or mats up to 1 m diameter and 0.2 m tall. Leaves densely imbricate, $3-4 \times 0.5-1$ mm., linear-oblong, widened and truncate at apex, 1-nerved, dorsal surface with brush of long hairs near base, glabrous above; ventral surface glabrous below, with brush of straight hairs at tip, exceeding and concealing lamina. Capitula 3-5 mm diameter. Inner involucral bracts linear, c.2.5 mm long, scarious on margins, obtuse to acute, tips erect, often white. Achenes < 1 mm. long, clad in stiff hairs; pappus-hairs c.2.5 mm long, stiff.

Flowering: Fruiting:

December - January - January - March

Threats:

A local, narrow range endemic common in its preferred habitat
