NZPCN Annual General Meeting

New Zealand Indigenous Flora Seed Bank (NZIFSB): Seed cleaning on the move again; August cleaning bee in Otaki

Building on the success of the seed cleaning bee at Otari Native Botanic Gardens and Wilton's Bush Reserve, Wellington, in July, Anthea McClelland, seed bank volunteer and Manawatu Forest and Bird chair, organised another off-site seed cleaning day; this time in Otaki. Eight members of the Otaki community took part including members of Forest and Bird, Transition Town Otaki and Waitohu Stream and Dune Care. A number in the group had taken part in the seed cleaning in July. The Otaki day was a result of requests to have a cleaning bee in Otaki. Anthea was joined from Massey University by visiting French intern student, Héloïse Colmet-Cartraud. The group, armed with tweezers, sieves, brushes and dexterous fingers, cleaned a range of seeds collected from parts of the North Island to as far south as Southland. The seed cleaned ranged from very demanding, tiny seeds with a lot of debris, to larger, relatively clean


seeds such as those from *Phormium*. Depending on the luck of the draw, some volunteers processed several collections whereas others processed just the one collection over four hours. A number in the group were also French-speakers so seed cleaning was combined with a chance to brush up on conversational French.

Anthea began the morning by explaining the seed-cleaning process and how this fits in with the overall picture of preparing seeds for the seed bank. Cleaning is just one part of a multi-step process and best practice must be applied at each stage, from collection to the final deposition of the seeds in the seed bank to ensure that seed

PLANT OF THE MONTH - MICROSORUM SCANDENS

Plant of the month for September is *Microsorum scandens*, mokimoki, a widespread indigenous fern, found in the North, South and Chatham Islands, and also in eastern Australia and on Lord Howe Island. Found in coastal and lowland forest, mokimoki is a common creeping or climbing fern covering rock piles, tree and tree fern trunks and bare ground.

Mokimoki is easily distinguished from the other two New Zealand *Microsorum* species by its thin rhizomes, 2–4 mm diameter, covered in erect dark brown to purple-brown scales, and its membranous, dull green, pleasantly scented fronds, which have narrower and more numerous pinnae. It is also much less drought tolerant so prefers less open, shaded and damper situations. Mokimoki is easily grown from rooted pieces of rhizome. It is excellent in a hanging basket, large pot, or trained to grow over rocks, and logs but requires a shaded site and needs frequent watering.

reach storage in as good a condition as possible. This will maximise the life span of the seed in storage (along with routine viability testing to make sure the seeds are surviving the banking process).

As in Wellington, the combined efforts of the volunteer cleaners have made a significant dent in

the number of collections waiting to be cleaned. Our thanks go to all those involved in both the Wellington and Otaki cleaning days. We look forward to having more cleaning bees in the future.

NZIFSB Alexandra Seed Collecting Workshop 30-31 October 2016

The second South Island seed collecting workshop for the New Zealand Indigenous Flora Seed Bank (NZIFSB) for 2016 will be held in conjunction with the Thyme Festival and will be based at Community House, Alexandra, and a field site in Central Otago for population assessment and potential seed collection on the second day. This workshop will cover the appropriate methods and protocols for collecting seed for the New Zealand Indigenous Flora Seed Bank. Attending a workshop is a requirement for anyone wishing to be involved in this project as a collector. Numbers for the workshop are capped at 20. The workshop will be led by the NZIFSB Project Leader, Craig McGill. The first day of training will cover theory and the second day will cover the practical side of collecting through an expedition into the surrounding environment. The details are:

- Date and time: Sunday 30 October Monday 31 October, 2016 (9.00 a.m. 4.00 p.m. each day).
- Venue: Alexandra Community House, 14–20 Centennial Avenue, Alexandra, for Sunday 30 October and a field site in Central Otago for 31 October.

Lucy Cranwell 2017 student grant for botanical research: call for applications

Applications are invited for the Lucy Cranwell Grant of \$2,500 from the Auckland Botanical Society to assist a student studying for the degree of PhD, MSc, BSc (Hons) or BApplSci at any tertiary institution in New Zealand whose thesis project deals with some aspect of New Zealand's flora and vegetation. Priority will be given to projects relevant to the northern half of the North Island.

The research project to be supported will be chosen on the basis of appropriateness to the objects of the Society, namely to encourage the study of botany, and to stimulate public interest in the plant life of New Zealand and its preservation, conservation and cultivation. The grant will be administered by the student's supervisor as a contribution to expenses associated with the project.

Conservation Week activity

No doubt throughout the country special activities occurred to mark Conservation Week 2016. One such event was a planting day on 17 September at Travis Wetland's nature heritage park, Christchurch. The planting day attracted over 100 volunteers who worked together to plant over 2000 native plants. The plants were donated by Trees for Canterbury and Christchurch City Council. The plan is to continue to plant an area of 6 ha of mixed podocarp forest that will provide habitat for a range of forest birds and invertebrates.
